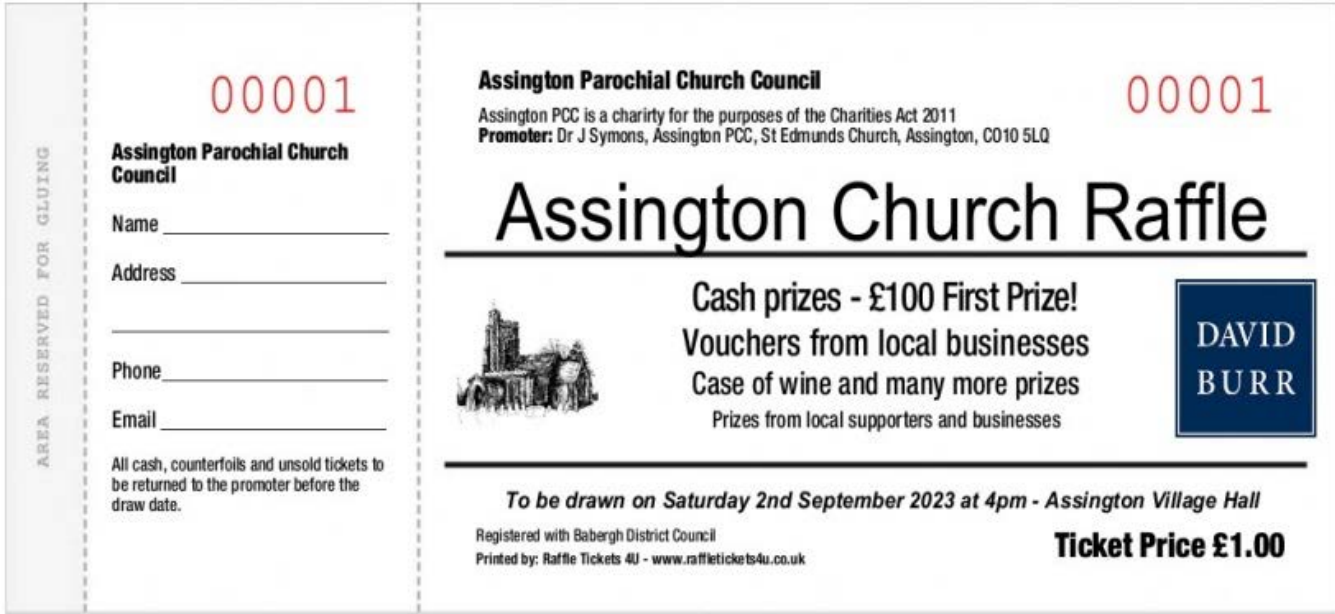

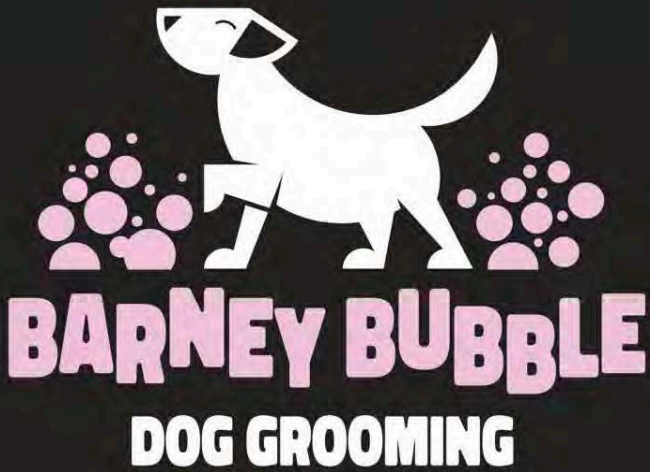

A VISIT TO RANWORTH BROAD

Ranworth Broad is close to Wroxham in the Norfolk Broads, but far enough away to be so much quieter and a better place to visit.

On the edge of the village of Ranworth is its church, St Helen's, standing on the top of a small hill, which is a rarity in Norfolk but giving good views over the surrounding countryside, especially if you climb to the top of the tower. There are warning signs at the entrance to the tower about the 87 uneven steps and the two ladders to reach the roof. Not being one to ignore a challenge I can add a heavy trap door and a very low safety rail to the hazards. However, the view is well worth the effort. The warning signs also hint at the church being locked up with someone still being up the tower, so perhaps better to visit earlier in the day.



Beyond the excitement of the tower the church is home to one of the finest rood screens in the country, with amazing 15th century pictures of the twelve Apostles in the centre. These have a supporting cast of characters from Arch Bishops to Arch Angels.



Also on display is the Sarum Antiphoner, written and illustrated by 15th Century monks on sheepskin. Still clear to read, if you did not fail your latin exams as I did.



A small road to the side of the church takes you to a Norfolk Wildlife Trust site. Walking along a wooden walkway over marsh lands, one reaches the Trust's information centre and shop. Time for an ice cream from the decking at the edge of Ranworth Broad whilst watching the wildlife. It was a very tranquil and restful site.

Returning back past the church and on to the unspoilt village where there is a choice of venues for refreshments, an attractive pub and a busy cafe at the Ranworth Broad Visitor Centre.



We had a boat trip booked on the Liana, an electric powered boat in the Edwardian style. Whilst boat trips and boats for hire in Wroxham were all booked, our boat trip was only shared with one family.

It was a lovely trip seeing the Broad from the water, some of the impressive waterside homes and learning



about the history of the Broads and the efforts to return the water to the crystal clear it was a century ago. Poor management of waste water, farm run off and boating have led to major changes in the ecology of the broads, something the Broads Authority are working to reverse.

Good weather helped, but this is a fantastic location for a day out from Assington.

NATURE WATCH

One day-time in late June I was walking around the garden when I noticed something large and dark, nestling (bottom outwards) deep between rose petals on a bloom-laden moss-type pale pink rose bush. I stopped to investigate, and saw that it was a large brilliantly-coloured iridescent green beetle. Putting my finger in gently to try to poke it out to have look at it, I managed to disturb it sufficiently so that it crawled out of "hiding".



After a short while, which gave me sufficient time to take a couple of photos, it flew away making a loud buzzing sound, rather like a drone.

This was, I believe, the first Rose Chafer beetle which I have seen in our garden.



Subsequently, a week later, having noticed that the Regale Lilies were being chewed, I found (the same?) Beetle munching away at the lily bloom. Whilst I was watching, the lily fell apart:

The Rose Chafer is a large (around 22mm long), broad metallic coppery-green beetle with small creamy-white streaks on its wing cases; it is found in grassland, scrub and along woodland edges and is often seen on flowers in gardens. The adults feed on flowers, particularly dog roses, during the summer and autumn, and can be spotted in warm, sunny weather. Rose Chafers are "widespread, but scarce, in England and Wales".

The larvae feed on decaying leaves, plants and roots, living in the soil for several years as they develop. When they pupate, they hibernate in the soil or in rotting wood over winter, ready to emerge as fully-formed adult beetles the following spring in late May or early June. They begin feeding on plants immediately and continue voraciously for about a month:



There is very little the rose beetle does not eat. They eat flowers, most especially roses and peonies. Chafer bugs cause a great deal of damage by leaving large numbers of ragged holes in blossoms, fruit, and also eat the leaves of a wide variety of plants. The beetles skeletonize the top layer of leaves on plants by eating away all of the soft tissue and leaving nothing but the large, tough veins.

At this time, female Rose Chafers lay eggs in the soil and then die. In about three weeks, the beetle eggs hatch to begin the whole cycle again.





Broomrape

In another part of our garden (the wildlife part!) a clump of Broomrape suddenly appeared. Broomrape is a mysterious plant; with no sign of any green parts, no stems, leaves or fruits, they emerge each year from the soil, solitarily or in clusters. These members of the Orobanchaceae family are all root parasites, obtaining their essential nutrients by tapping into the subterranean parts of other plants. This means they do not require green parts so remain hidden from view until their flowers emerge. The flowers have all the petals fused into a tube and most species carry them on a single spike.

The distribution of each species is defined by the availability of the host species. Some are generalists and occur on a number of different species, but most are more particular and a knowledge of the host species and their distribution can help in finding these plants.

The identification of some Broomrapes are variable and can be tricky.

There are various types of Broomrape:
Ivy Broomrape; Knapweed Broomrape; Greater Broomrape; Yarrow Broomrape; Hemp Broomrape; and

Common Broomrape (*Orobanche minor*)

Native. Widespread and found on a wide range of host species, especially members of the pea and daisy families. Flowers June to July. A very variable species, perhaps in part due to the wide range of host species parasitised. An increasingly common host is the ornamental Shrubby Ragwort, upon which the broomrape flowers can get to some 60cm tall. Variably pinkish-purple and yellowish in colour. Flowers neatly curved from the base.

I think we have the common Broomrape!

Stag/Lesser Stag Beetle

Once again this year on a walk in Leavenheath my friend Susan and I spotted a huge black beetle, approx 4cm long shambling across a footpath.

My feeling is that it is a Lesser Stag Beetle, (male?) but am awaiting confirmation from the experts.....

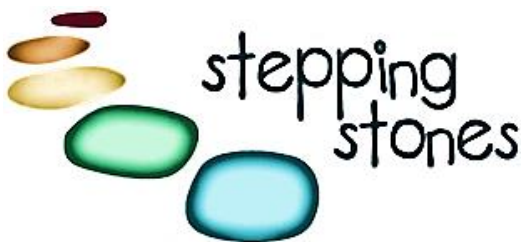

Letter from the Rev Mary Cantacuzene, Bures with Assington and Little Cornard



Dear Friends

When people think about the church they sometimes think that people who attend each Sunday must be "good"; actually we are probably, not any better than anyone else (!) We are just more aware of our own failings and shortcomings, because we are trying to measure up to the standard set by Jesus Christ.

In a recent poll, different Christian churches and religious groups were asked to select (from a choice of 24) a list of six virtues that they would consider most important in their faith. They could choose from: charity, citizenship, civility, community, compassion, confidence, critical thinking, curiosity, devotion, gratitude, honesty, humility, integrity, justice, kindness, neighbourliness, perseverance, piety, reflection, resilience, service, teamwork, tolerance and wisdom.

More than a third of Christian churches chose this combination in order: charity, honesty, devotion, civility, citizenship, and community awareness.

When we first meet with Jesus we might be dismally aware of our own lack of some (or all!) of the above, but that does not mean we can't be part of a group of people who are at least trying. When we become Christians we are invited to "come as you are", not pretending to be paragons of virtue.

Life sometimes feels like a series of battles and worries; most people's lives are difficult in some way or other. God speaks to us through the prophet Zephaniah:

"Your God is with you and is mighty to save you. He celebrates and sings because of you, and he will refresh your life with his love." (Zephaniah 3.17).

May God refresh **your** life with his love!

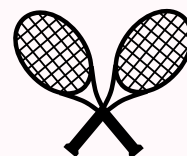

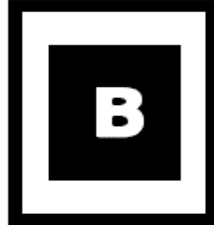

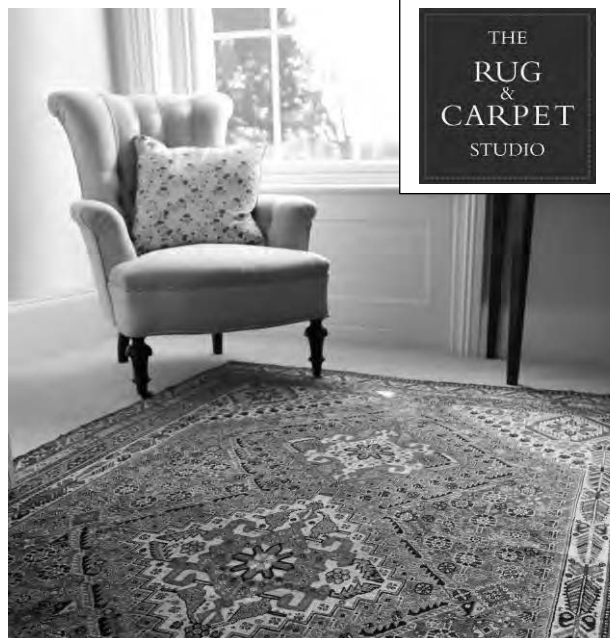

VISIT FROM AMERICA

We recently had a visit from an American family living in California, who wished to visit Assington, its church and graveyard, to trace the area from which their ancestors originated.

We had a similar visit a couple of years ago, but from a totally different family, living in a totally different place in the USA, but whose ancestors were the same people who lived and died in Assington in the early 17th Century.

The story begins with Jacob French, who was born in Assington Suffolk, in approx 1553, (the year when King Edward VI died, and Queen Mary I was ultimately declared Queen). Jacob's father was called Thomas French, and he resided on a farm at Assington called Garlands, which was owned by John Gurdon, Lord of the Manor in Assington.

Jacob married Susan Warren, on 27 September 1578 in Bures St Mary, Suffolk . By this time Queen Elizabeth I was on the throne.

Susan Warren was born in 1555, in Assington, Suffolk. Her father, William Warren, was 51 and her mother, Katherine Anne Blount, was 45. She married Jacob French in September 1578 / 9, in Bures Saint Mary, Suffolk.

They were the parents of at least 5 sons and 3 daughters:

Records of these children are shown below:

- William French, christened. 25 Jul 1580 in Bures St. Mary, Suffolk: "William French was baptised xxvth July 1580." He may have been named after his grandfather on his mother's side, William Warren.
- Jacob French, baptised 12 Aug 1582 at Bures St. Mary, Suffolk. "Jacob French was baptised xij August 1582."
- **Thomas French**, baptised 11 Oct 1584 at Bures St. Mary, Suffolk. "Thomas French son of Jacob was baptised same day ..."-He moved to Assington in about 1585 or 1586, and there married Susan Riddlesdale, 5 September 1608. Emigrated to New England
- Elizabeth French, baptised 27 Feb 1586/7 in Assington.
- Susan French, baptised. 1589-98, died 1 Aug 1613 Assington.
- John French, baptised 27 Mar 1596, Assington. John married (1) Sarah, about 1620; their daughter Sarah was buried at Assington 22 Jan 1620/21.
- Robert French, baptised 25 Jun 1600, Assington--both parents, Jacob and Susan, are mentioned in his baptismal record.

Jacob and Susan, and family moved back to Assington in 1585 / 86 - perhaps to take over the farm following in his father's footsteps?

Jacob died 11 November 1615 at about age 62, in Assington, and Susan died in 1614 aged 58 and she was also buried in Assington.

The previous visitors tracing their ancestry were particularly interested in William French, (son of the eldest son William above), who departed with his wife, Elizabeth, and their son (also William) in 1635 for the New Colony in Eastern America, owing to his association with Roger Harlackenden of Earls Colne, and following in the footsteps of John Winthrop of Groton.

John Winthrop ** emigrated in 1630 to take charge of the Massachusetts Company, and later founded the city of Boston and became the first Governor of the State of Massachusetts.

On this occasion in June 2023, our visitors were wishing to trace Thomas French, the second son of Jacob, his wife Susan, and their descendants.



Thomas French was born in either Bures or Assington in 1584 and married Susannah (Sara) Riddlesdale in Assington on 5th September 1608.

Susannah Riddlesdale was born in Boxford and was christened on 20 April 1584, in Boxford, Suffolk, England, her father, John Riddlesdale, was 26 and her mother, Dorcas, was 24.

Thomas and Susannah raised their family in Assington, and their children were as follows:

- Margaret
- **Thomas, Born 27 November 1608**, married Mary Scudamore in Boston Lincolnshire UK and died 8th August 1680 in **Ipswich, Essex, Massachusetts**.
- Alice, born 9 April 1610 in Assington, married Thomas Howlett in **Ipswich, Essex, Massachusetts** in 1634, and died on 26 June 1666 in **Topsfield, Essex, Massachusetts**.
- Edward, Born in Assington approx 1612, married Ann Goodale, in **Ipswich, Essex, Massachusetts**, in approx 1627, and died 28 December 1674 in **Salisbury, Essex, Massachusetts**.
- John born in Assington approx 1612 (or 1622). He married Freedom Kingston (or Kingsbury, or Mary Kingsley) and died in 1692 (or 1696/7), possibly in **Deerfield, Massachusetts**.
- Sarah, born in 1612 in Assington, and died 1 November 1615 or in Assington.
- Dorcas, born 31 July 1614 in Assington, Married Griffin Craft, George Craft, and Christopher Peake.
- She died 30 December 1697 in **Roxbury, Suffolk, Massachusetts**.
- Susan, born 22 April 1616 in Assington.
- Ann, born 15 March 1616/17 in Assington
- Sarah, born in Assington in 1621, died Assington 1621
- Mary, born in Assington 6 January 1624/25, married George Smith 1645 in **Massachusetts**, no record of death.

From the details above we can see that a number of the French family members of two generations made the move from England to the New Colony.

Research suggests that the family did not all travel to the new Colony, at the same time. First Thomas junior (1608 - 1680) and his sister Alice emigrated in 1630, probably with the Winthrop fleet.

***The Winthrop Fleet was a group of 11 ships led by John Winthrop (1588 - 1649, who became Lord of the Manor in Groton, Suffolk, and later followed his father in becoming a lawyer in London, before taking a lead role in the Great Migration. A fleet of five ships had departed a month previously for New England that included approx 300 colonists led by Francis Higginson. However, the colony leaders and the bulk of the colonists remained in England for the time being to plan more thoroughly for the success of the new colony. In October 1629, the group elected John Winthrop to be Governor of the Fleet and the Massachusetts Bay Colony. Over the ensuing winter, the leaders recruited a large group of Puritan families, representing all manner of skilled labor to ensure a robust colony. Seven hundred men, women, and children were distributed among the ships of the fleet. Many were sick during the voyage. The flow of Puritans to New England continued for another ten years, during a period known as the Great Migration.*



Thomas and his sister Alice French first lived in Boston, and by 1635 settled in Ipswich, Essex County, Massachusetts Bay Colony, The sisters Dorcas and Susan came in 1633, as maids or servants in the John Winthrop family.

Thomas (senior) and his wife, Susannah French emigrated to Ipswich, in 1635, five years after their son, Thomas had emigrated, taking their four younger children with them.

Thomas French (senior) died about 5 November 1639 in **Ipswich, Essex, Massachusetts** and Susannah his wife died in August 1658, in **Ipswich, Essex, Massachusetts Bay Colony**, British Colonial America, at the age of 74.

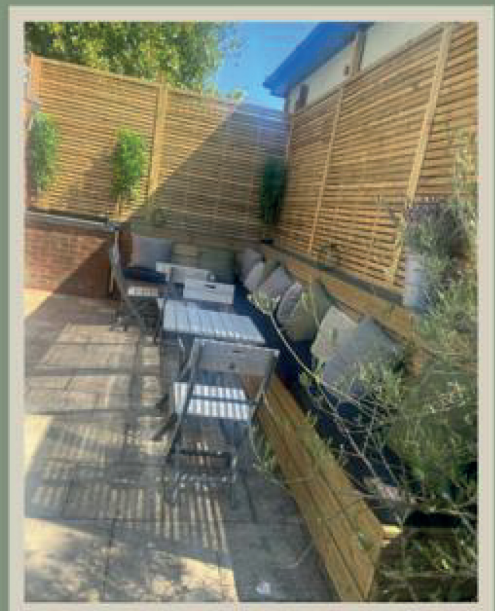


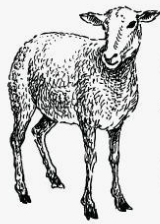
