# THE OLD WORKHOUSE CONTINUED Part 2

The Old Workhouse was purpose-built to accommodate the poorest and most vulnerable Assington parishioners for 53 years (1784 – 1837). During this time hundreds of people would have come through its doors. There is, however, virtually no narrative of these lives or their experiences. This instalment aims to give some voice to the staff and the inmates who lived, and died, at our workhouse. We are unlikely to find any first-hand accounts of life at Assington Workhouse, but we strive to add some 'human colour' to the physical remains that we are preserving.

We begin by examining the existing structure of The Old Workhouse. For example, the governor's quarters, situated at the garden end of the building were better appointed than the spaces for the poor. The governor had rush bottomed armchairs (rather than simple stools that the inmates used), shelves, cupboards, candlesticks, a copper tea kettle, and a small fireplace on the first floor. The only other fire was in the large inglenook on the ground floor, the Wardroom. This large room contained 18 spinning wheels, two yarn reels and a loom. The Overseer's Books record cloth being sold. The able bodied would have been required to work on spinning and weaving to help with their keep.



We believe that up to 25 people slept on the first and second (garret) floors. Many of the timbers that formed the supports for the later cottages (after 1837) have rows of holes drilled in them; many can still be seen. We believe that they formed the side supports of the beds for the poor. Rope would have been strung between these side panels to provide support for straw mattresses.

Workhouse accounts show that one bed would have slept up to four people: either head to toe or in shifts. The Overseers' Books show sheets being laundered (in-house) and blankets being purchased. Males, females, and

children almost certainly slept together, which seems the norm in early rural workhouses. Later union workhouses enforced separations of families.

One of our most intriguing and enigmatic finds was one small Lancashire clog. It seems too small to have been used for a child, although we know that items such as shoes and blankets were given as poor relief. We wonder whether the clog had been an apprentice piece, as there is some

evidence that young boys were schooled in shoe making. Or it may have been used in the workhouse to ward off evil spirits; this practice was quite common in the 18<sup>th</sup> century where shoes were left near fireplaces and entry points. Our clog was just lying in an upstairs garret room, so we do not know where it had been previously.

Reading and writing were not the norm for rural communities such as Assington. Even the first Governor, Ambrose Wright in 1784, was illiterate. He drew a cross on his contract, which was noted as "*the mark of Ambrose Wright*". Although we have found names of Governors, Overseers and Church Officials from the Overseer's Books, tracing the names and biographical detail of inmates is more difficult. A useful source is so called Removal Orders (to and from Assington). From the 17<sup>th</sup> century provision for the poor included the stipulation that a particular parish was responsible for its own poor citizens. Therefore, if a person, or family, sought poor relief in a parish other than their own they were removed to their parish of origin. These documents provide some names and biographical detail, albeit incomplete. For example, sometimes only the husband's name was given - "*Nathaniel King and his wife*"; "*William Barford and his wife and child, 1-month old son William*". Sometimes marital status was listed - "*Mary Ransom, singlewoman [sic]*"; "*Susan Randall, widow*". Many entries either omitted or approximated children's ages. - "*Ann Death (wife of James Death) and Ann their infant daughter*"; "*James and Sarah Pilgrim and child Mary aged about 6 weeks*"; "*Wallor Lee and his daughter Mary aged upwards of 8 years*"; "*Robert and Elizabeth Robertson and children, Robert, William, Lucy, Mary, and George*". Occasionally we glean some insight into jobs that people did - "*William (labourer) and Elizabeth Rule*"; "*John and Jane Crissel and Johnathan their child of about 18<sup>th</sup> months. John is a private soldier in the East Essex Regiment of the Militia*".

The Parish Council were responsible for ensuring that the Workhouse provided their poor with the essentials for survival. As well as the roof over their heads and somewhere to sleep, the Parish paid for laundry, "*washing*" and "*shaving (of elderly men)*", "*haircuts for girls*", maintenance of items such as "*brooms, boilers, coppers, kettles*", and coffins when the need arose (we have preserved the coffin hatch on the garret floor). Providing food and drink for the residents was perhaps the most important aspect of responsibility. Workhouse meals are portrayed as simple but sustaining. They mainly consisted of gruel, 'thin' meat stew, and bread and cheese. Assington's Overseer's records show purchases of whole pigs and cuts of pork, meat (type unspecified), butter, and cheese. The 1808 inventory lists "*16 wood trenchers*" (plates), "*kneading trough*" for baking bread (we have the remains of a bread oven), "*three pork tubs*", a "*meat keeler*" and "*six beer casks*". Beer was brewed in-house as hops were delivered. This was called small beer, which was weak, and drunk in preference to water from the well just behind the Workhouse. Additional beer was also bought in. We have found no mention of milk delivery although milk was recommended for brewing weak tea for



children, pregnant women and the very sick. It is possible that the Workhouse had a cow or goat/s as preventing fresh milk from going sour was virtually impossible. Similarly, there is no mention of sugar being delivered, or anything resembling a sweet treat. Sugar was an expensive and 'exotic' ingredient only available to the rich. Interestingly, some tobacco was occasionally purchased, although we don't know who smoked it. So, we hope that you have enjoyed our glimpses into the past. Any insights or comments that you may have would be gratefully received.

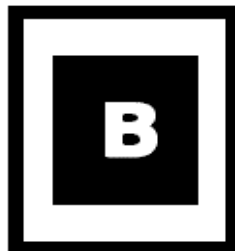

# NATURE WATCH

Whilst out cycling near Edwardstone an unfamiliar bird flew out in front of me and, restricted by high hedges, continued to fly just in front of me for about two hundred yards. It then went up into a low tree where I was able to observe it further before it realised it was under scrutiny and disappeared off across fields.

On my return home I looked up what it was and discovered it was a Hobby. According to the reference book, "This is a small falcon that winters in Africa, south of the Sahara, returning to the heathland and farmland of southern England in April."

If that were the case, I think this one may have arrived earlier on the recent winds from the Sahara ; the late-January early-February southerlies which have provided our mild weather.

However, further research reveals:

"Relatively scarce and secretive when breeding, the Hobby is a difficult bird to census. A few thousand pairs are thought to breed here, with the population restricted to the southern half of Britain and exhibiting greatest abundance in the south-east.



Hobbies are our only bird of prey that feed regularly on large insects, which it catches in flight with its feet. Dragonflies are its favourite food, but it will also take birds ( - no!! - often fast flying birds such as swallows and swifts!) which it catches in mid-air.



It has long scythe like wings, dark blue-grey above with some chestnut underneath. It was clearly a fast and agile bird, but must have been recovering from its long journey for me to be able to keep up.

Hobbies nest in old nests of crows and other birds. The tree selected is most often one in a hedge or on the extreme edge of a spinney, from where the bird can observe intruders from a considerable distance.



Another unusual sighting was a Hornet that I disturbed whilst turning the compost heaps. Despite their reputation, this was docile enough for me to move to safety and continue with my gardening.

The fearsome-looking hornet may not be a well-loved insect, but it is actually much less aggressive than the common wasp. It is also an important pollinator and a predator of species that feed on plants and crops, so can be a gardener's friend.

The hornet is a large social wasp that has a brown thorax and brown and yellow stripes on its body, rather than black and yellow. It has an obvious 'waist' between the thorax and abdomen.



The similar-looking Asian hornet has recently arrived

in the UK, but has a mainly brown abdomen except for one yellow segment. It is smaller than our native hornet. *It is a notifiable insect.*

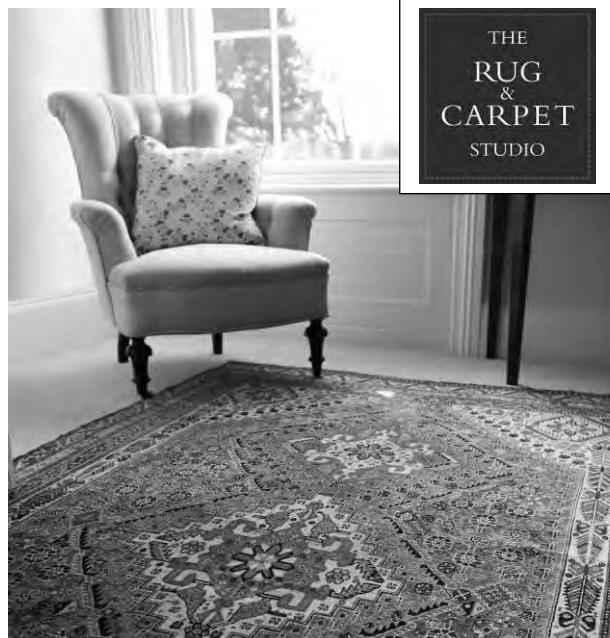

# THE REV. DR. BANHAM

Following a recent enquiry which I received, regarding an erstwhile Vicar of Assington, the Rev. Dr HENRY FRENCH BANHAM, I was interested to find out more during my research, and thought that I would share this local history. The Rev Dr Banham was the Vicar of Assington from 1901 until his death in 1932, aged 86.



Unfortunately I haven't been able to find out any details of Henry Banham's early life; he only goes into print from his days as a student at Cambridge University.

The following details appeared in the 1932 edition of "The Eagle", volume 209, a magazine supported by members of St John's College, (Cambridge), in an obituary to him:

"The Reverend Dr Henry French Banham matriculated at Sidney Sussex College in 1866, but migrated to St John's. He graduated as a junior optime in the Mathematical Tripos and

took a third class in the Natural Sciences Tripos of 1869. He then took up medicine, training at St Thomas's Hospital, and graduated M.B. in 1874 and M.D. in 1881. He was physician to the Royal Berkshire Hospital, lecturer in medicine at the Sheffield Medical School, and honorary consulting physician to the Sheffield General Infirmary. At the age of 45 he was ordained by the Bishop of London to a curacy at St Peter's, Islington, and in 1894 was appointed vicar of Tuddenham St Martin, Suffolk.

In 1901 he became vicar of Assington, and in 1923 was appointed rural dean of Sudbury. He died at Assington Vicarage, Suffolk, on 18 May 1932, aged 86."

In earlier editions of The Assington News, a series of excerpts from a private autobiography of a former resident appeared, entitled :

"EXCERPTS FROM A PRIVATE AUTOBIOGRAPHY of MAJOR HENRY O TOMKINS (1894 - ?1980).

Henry had lived in the village of Assington as a child between about 1895 and 1908, when he joined the army at the age of 14. Among the many anecdotes of Assington Life at that time appeared the following :

***"The vicar was Dr H Banham, and if ever there was a Christian Gentleman, he was it.***

***I believe he was comparatively wealthy and was the kindest man I have ever known. The Church was packed every Sunday morning and evening. In the summer time we all had to attend both main services as well as Sunday School. In fact, Sunday was quite a gala day. More often than not, Dad would attend both services, In the morning, he would be togged out in his morning coat and top hat, and in the evening in a lounge suit. All the elite of the village wore top hats. We had our own pew which was fourth from the pulpit. The folk from the Hall had their pews in the Chancel and any strangers who came in would have to stand, unless some of the regulars were absent. What a pity there are no more like Dr Banham. His wonderful personality gained him the respect of everyone and they all showed it by their attendance at Church."***

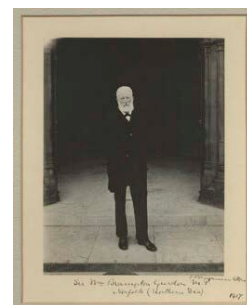
My further research uncovered the following account from a 1902 edition of the **Suffolk Institute, Volume XI Part 2**. This account gives a potted history of our local church and 'Big House', as it was thought/believed (?inaccurately?) at the time of delivery:

## **"ASSINGTON CHURCH AND THE HALL.**

The West Suffolk party had the pleasure on the return journey of a visit to Assington Church and Hall. Sir Brampton Gurdon, President of the Institute, regretted that he had to return to London, but he requested Rev. Dr. Banham to show the party the Church and the Hall; and he left some interesting notes for the assistance of the guide.

The church was visited first.

A church was said to have been built here after the battle between the Saxons and the Danes in 1010, by King Canute, and a religious establishment was raised on the site of the present hall to perform masses for the souls of heroes. The present church was erected late in the 14th or early in the 15th century. The chancel fell down in 1827, and was entirely rebuilt. Two of the monuments Were so much injured that it was impossible to restore them. The present monuments comprise one in the Chancel to Robert. Gurdon (died 1577) and his wife, Rosa Sexton, of Lavenham; and John Gurdon (died 1623) and his wife; Amy Brampton, of Letton in Norfolk. Under these were the smaller figures, representing Robert's son, John, and his daughter, Elizabeth, who married Thomas



Waldegrave, of Bures, her portrait being over the chimney-piece in the dining-room at the hall.

The children, represented under John's Monument were his son, Brampton (to whom there was a monument in the aisle), and his daughter, Elizabeth, who died unmarried at Blickling Hall, Norfolk, where there is a monument in the church erected to her by Sir Edward Clare. The monument in Assington was raised in obedience to the will of John Gurdon. In the south aisle there is a monument to Brampton. Gurdon (M.P. for Sudbury), who is placed between his two wives. He died in 1648(-9). One wife was Elizabeth Barrett, 'the ancestors of the Gurdons of Suffolk, and the other Muriel Sedley, ancestors of the Gurdons of Norfolk. The coats of arms at the sides represent the sons and son-in-laws, nearly all regicides. Next to this is a simple mural tablet to John Gurdon (died 1679). He was M.P. for Ipswich and Suffolk, and a member of the Council of State. In his time the property was forfeited, which accounted for the humility of his monument. The monument to his elder son, Robert, who Married a daughter of Lord Lysk and died 1683, was destroyed by the fall of the chancel. The church was "restored" about 40 or 50 years ago, when many interesting points were destroyed. Apparently from records in the British Museum, there was formerly some good stained glass here, and Sir Brampton Gurdon wrote that there must be some gravestones inside the rails of the chancel. The tower was rebuilt, almost an exact copy of the original.

Before the church was quitted Dr. Banham referred to the gravestones of Rev. and Mrs. Walker. In connection with Mr. Walker was related a pathetic and interesting piece of history. He endeavoured to dissuade one of the Gurdons from going to London to sign the death warrant of King Charles. Gurdon at first was not to be moved. So earnest was the pious incumbent, his appeal having failed, that on the morning when Gurdon was to drive to London, he laid 'himself across the path over which the coach would pass, and said, " If you go, you shall drive over my body. ' This so touched Gurdon that his journey was abandoned, and his signature was not on the death warrant.

The party next proceeded to the hall. On entering they were shown the five pardons four from King Charles II and one from James II., from which the hall and a small part of the estate were restored: At the opposite end of the room was seen the mantel-piece (with armorial bearings) from the old dining-room. The present house is supposed to be the back part of a quadrangle, which was gradually pulled down to suit the reduced estate. The old stables were in front of the house, where the cedar trees now stand. These were planted by Philip Gurdon about 1770. Over the dining-room door was a portrait of Robert Gurdon (in tilting armour) who died in 1577. Over the door opposite the front door, were the portraits of John Gurdon and Amy Brampton.

A large handsome picture, a copy of a Van Dyck, of Sir Nathaniel Bacon, of Stiffkey Hall in Norfolk, a relation of the family, was pointed out. Over the chimney-piece, in the dining-room, is a portrait of Elizabeth Waldegrave, née.Gurdon. There were also pictures of Brampton Gurdon, who died 1648 - 9 and one of a head of a monk by Van Dyck. This picture had belonged to Sir Joshua Reynolds, and Sir Thomas Lawrence. Then there was 'Edmund Dyer,' by Sir Joshua Reynolds, painted for Edmund Burke. Near-by, Queen Elizabeth's 'Lord Essex', and 'Anne Boleyn', a relative of the family.

In the drawing room were seen some fine pictures. The best, Sir Brampton considered, was a little Teniere, representing the " Sense of Smell "; others were by Berghem and Van Goyen, and there was " Haddon

Hall " by Crossich, Sir Brampton counting these among his best art treasures.

There was, it was stated, a monastery here up to 1310. The present house was probably built not very long after this time, but of course has been several times altered; the large oak beams may be of the 14th century. It seems to have been thoroughly changed and the old windows destroyed about the beginning of the 18th century; some of these contained armorial glass.

The porch, minarets, and turret at the back, were added between 1820 and '1830, when the front was faced with brick, it being really a timber house.

The registers date back to 1598. The Dyers, the Mumfords, and the Weymarkes are old names of residents.

In 1681, " Mrs. An Gurdon," and in 1862 " Mrs. Brampton Gurdon " are both entered as " buried in lining " (linen).

After thanks to Dr. Banham and Sir Brampton for their kindness, the return journey was completed, Sudbury being reached just before seven o'clock."

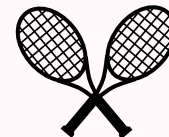

# ASSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

## Matters of Interest discussed during a meeting held at Assington village Hall on Monday 29 January 2024

**Present:** Councillors Simon Thorogood, Andrew Hill, Ian Jordan, Bronwen Stacey, Helen Wallace

**In attendance:** Cllr James Finch, DCllr Lee Parker, Christine Hargan (Clerk) there were no members of the public present

**Apologies** for absence

Cllrs Tony Howcroft and David Wiles

■ **To receive declarations of interests and requests for dispensation** from Councillors :  
There were None

■ **To agree Minutes** of Assington Parish Council meetings held on 3<sup>rd</sup> January 2024 and 27<sup>th</sup> November 2023, the minutes of 3<sup>rd</sup> January were amended to read object both sets of minutes were then resolved correct and signed by the Chairman

■ **County and District Councillor reports and public forum**

★ **Cllr Finch updated his SCC report on the following:**

- 10 year commitment to improve roads
- The Government committed the County Council to increased costs of £5.4 Million due to increase in living wage, but have provided no funding to cover it. Due to the deficit and high proportion of costs going to adult services and SEND there will be cuts to Arts and museums budgets. Councillors enquired what other budgets may be cut – Cllr Finch stated there were no plans to cut Libraries or transport budgets.
- Bid for buses - Chambers will now stop in the middle of Assington village.
- Adult Care services have been rated good by the Care Commission.
- Trading Standards are particularly active at Felixstowe Port.
- Rendlesham archaeological dig has uncovered some amazing finds to rival Sutton Hoo.
- National Grid all Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex County Councils continue to object and are pursuing information made available in the original plan. NG did not disclose that their shareholding company in America which has developed cables with three times the capacity of the existing ones and therefore could avoid the need for new pylons by simply restringing existing with new cable. The local MP says that NG are looking seriously at offshoring ahead of the Norwich to Tilbury project.

★ **Cllr Parker presented his BDC Report**

- 128 new council homes acquired across the two district councils, 42 in BDC; this is net of the 60 homes lost via right to buy.
- Warm spaces £21k grants have been made across BDC district.
- Second homes and empty properties to be brought back into use; there are 600 empty properties across the district, the council plans to resolve this by doubling council tax for empty properties, if they remain empty for over a year. Grants are available to bring the homes back to standard for the housing market. The difference between second homes and empty homes was defined as, in effect, second homes are furnished and used.
- BDC is encouraging developers to join the “Considerate Constructors” scheme, first rural council to create this scheme which may form a condition in future planning applications, the cost of membership will be borne by the developer.

•Cabinet will press ahead with a community engagement process re parking charges in BDC. The budget deficit is increasing to £1.8m. The income from parking will offset the business rates that BDC pay to the government for the car parks. There is pressure on Sudbury Town Council to take over their town’s car parks. Councillors reiterated the view that in past consultations the public have been clear in their preference to pay for parking through council taxes, not parking charges, and that Babergh should respect this. Imposition of short stay (<1hr) charges would particularly damage communities and the towns.

•**DC/21/02579 Assington Autos** The application will be heard by Committee; the process will involve a site visit followed by a hearing - date to be confirmed. There will be up to 3 speakers for the application; an objector, Assington PC and the applicant who will each have 3 minutes. DCllr Parker confirmed that the visit will include all relevant areas to the application.

o Status of **planning applications**

•Acknowledged

•Cllr Parker commented that Parishes are not always interpreting their Neighbourhood plan in the same manner as the Planners.

■ **Finance**

•Receive the RFO report

- Reconciliation of accounts against budget : acknowledged
- Resolved to authorise payments to be made as per the schedule
- Transfer of funds and closure of Barclay accounts has taken place but since then there is a further interest payment into the deposit account. Cllrs are unable to authorise payment therefore Clerk has drafted a letter to Barclays Bank requesting them to transfer the funds to the new Unity Trust Bank unanimously agreed.

■ **CIL expenditure**

•Cllr Wiles has requested a grant to enable a shed to be purchased which would be used as a food bank at the Village Hall **resolved** to fund the £180 requested for the shed from CIL monies, but also to suggest that a larger unit might be needed.

■ **Update on National Grid Bramford to Twinstead reinforcement**

The Planning Inspectorate’s examination of the proposed scheme is now nearing its end, and the Council believe that everything possible has been done to draw attention to local concerns. Since the last meeting, however, a potential new cable technology has come to light, which could theoretically remove the need for the new pylon line altogether. Given National Grid’s statutory obligation to evaluate all options to find the best value for money for the bill payer - which has been the applicant’s consistent refrain when presented with alternatives to reduce the impact of the scheme - failure to do this would risk undermining the validity of the application. The Council is working to publicise this development with all the relevant stakeholders.

•The Clerk was asked to write to Simon White the previous auditor thanking him for his services.

■ **Date of the next meeting** 25<sup>th</sup> March to be held in the Village Hall at 7.30pm, preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting at 7pm.

Still angry that I let myself down at the village show and be beaten for the largest marrow, so gloves off this year and will be planting soon into the very stinkiest muck with some black mud from the new pond. Should be good newtrians in all that with some cabbage water as well. Hope it is to be held again this year, revenge will be sweet. Not that I am that competitive or anything, just like to win.

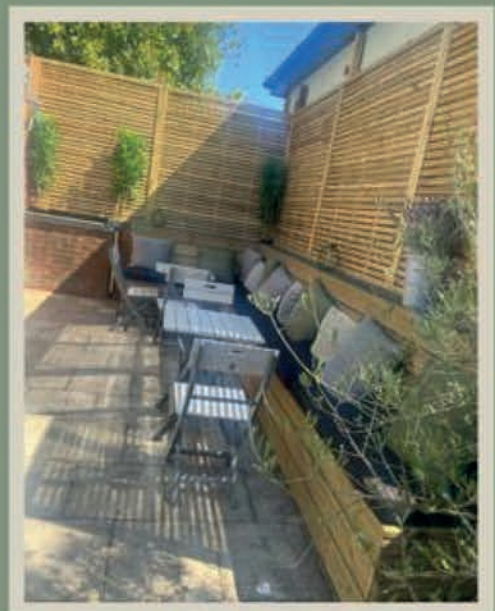
