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GLIDING EXPERIENCE

Have you ever wondered what it's like to soar in the sky like a bird, well I have to admit it wasn't high on my bucket list, but after my first flight in a glider I realised what I had been missing!

On Saturday 21st September, the Essex & Hertfordshire Gliding Club held their Open Day at Wormingford Airfield and as it was so local I thought I would go and see why people took to the sky in a glider. My first port of call was the simulator, which I had meant to try at the Assington Fete as I thought that it would give me an insight into my flight. Luckily, I am pretty agile as I squeezed myself into the cockpit and the girl explained what the various dials meant and then set up the screen in front of me. First of all, I couldn't remember



whether you pulled the rudder back to climb or pushed it forward and therefore managed a few spins, which seemed very realistic and then a complete nosedive and managed to crash twice - I hoped this wasn't an omen for my flight! Anyway, after making a real hash of the simulator, I looked forward to the real thing and hoped that the glider trip would be safer.

David Wilde, who lives in Assington, was my pilot and it was time to put on my parachute, where I was given full instructions on how to activate it - I was told that so far nobody had reason to use one, but then there is always a first time!! I



clambered into the cockpit and after being strapped in tightly and with my heart thumping like it was going to burst, we set off at high speed, bumping down the grass runway whilst being pulled up by a giant winch. I was amazed how hard you were pressed back into the seat, but finally the

winch wire was released and there we were soaring up in the sky, just like a bird.

Oh my goodness, what a wonderful perspective of the beautiful countryside we live in; ploughed fields, stubble fields and a huge patchwork of all colours and all within a peaceful little cockpit as we floated quietly up in the sky. Although the morning wasn't that clear, David pointed out various landmarks and on a clear day one can sometimes see Harwich and of course, soar on the thermals. All too soon it was time to return to base and as we descended and smoothly landed, I was on a real high; what an amazing experience that was.

Unfortunately, the Glider club is losing its home after 2026 and is desperately looking for another venue where they can operate from. It will be such a shame if they have to disband, since the members were so friendly and made it such a memorable morning of flying, refreshments and even a lady who had knitted some lovely toys so I was able to buy my little grandson a birthday present. Thank you to all concerned, especially David Wilde, who persuaded me to try gliding - I feel I could be hooked!!

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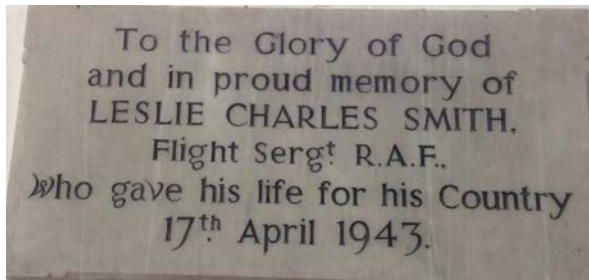


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ASSINGTON REMEMBERS

In November we pay tribute to the many young men of Assington who gave their lives, or whose lives were changed irrevocably by the two wars of the twentieth century - the larger numbers in the 1914-1918 WWI, and the one in WWII. Here I have attempted to provide a few more details of the person who is remembered for his part in WWII, and whose memorial is set into the wall of the church:



In the 2023 November Edition of the Assington News, the following excerpt from a Parish magazine of May 1943 was published:

THE PARISH MAGAZINE May 1943 "ASSINGTON"

My first duty this month is to extend to Mrs Harry Smith and her family our profoundest sympathy in this time of trial. As a parish we are justly proud that her son, Leslie took part in what was the greatest raid of this war, and by doing so represented us in the tremendous struggle against evil things. Whatever maybe be the ultimate news about Leslie, we pray that God Himself will grant the needed courage and strength.

This leads me to say that, the forth-coming "wings for Victory" week in Assington (May 8th - 15th) with its challenge of £2000 for the target, has a special interest for all in this parish. We have now a personal account to settle, and we must see to it that Leslie's fellow-crews and pilots shall not lack the very best machines to carry on the job he was forced to leave in their hands....."

Although sadly, very little information is readily available to "flesh out" the story, the following details have been pulled together.

The history of No.460 Squadron is interesting, as it places Flight Sergeant Leslie Charles Smith of Assington in an active role at the forefront of the battle for freedom for his country, and his village:

"No. 460 Squadron RAAF was formed from 'C' Flight of No. 458 Squadron RAAF at RAF Molesworth, Huntingdonshire on 15 November 1941, as a bomber squadron equipped with Wellington Mk.IV aircraft.

Originally part of No. 8 Group RAF, Bomber Command, the squadron moved to RAF Brighton, Yorkshire and joined No. 1 Group RAF. The squadron made its first raid, against the German city of Emden, on 12 March 1942. The following night, five crews from the squadron participated in a raid on harbour facilities around Dunkirk, during which the squadron suffered its first losses of the war when one Wellington was shot down. A six-week "apprenticeship" period followed until the end of April 1942, during which the squadron was assigned mainly to attack less heavily defended targets on the French Channel coast; nevertheless, the squadron also undertook several attacks against targets in Germany during this time.

The squadron's first three months of operations saw it carry out 34 raids. For each raid, at least two aircraft were contributed, with some raids seeing as many as 10 aircraft taking part; a 30 May 1942 raid on Cologne saw 18 aircraft from No. 460 Squadron assigned. A total of six crews were lost during these raids.

Losses between June and August 1942 amounted to 20 aircraft, and at the end of the period the squadron began to convert to Halifax Mk.IIs, but in October the squadron was re-equipped with Lancaster Mk. I and III.



As we know, it was at this juncture, during April 1943, that Leslie was killed in action over Germany.

.....The following May, No. 460 Squadron relocated to RAF Binbrook, Lincolnshire, from where it participated in the strategic bombing of Germany.

In late 1943 and early 1944, the squadron flew sorties in the Battle of Berlin. During the spring and summer of 1944, the squadron flew many missions in support of the D-Day landings. Its final raid was an attack on Adolf Hitler's mountain retreat of Berchtesgaden on Anzac Day, 1945.

In May, No. 460 Squadron joined Operation Manna, the transportation of relief supplies to starving Dutch civilians. The squadron moved to RAF East Kirkby, Lincolnshire, in preparation for re-location to the Pacific theatre, as part of a proposed Commonwealth strategic air force known as Tiger Force, for the invasion of Japan. The move became unnecessary following the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and No. 460 Squadron disbanded on 10 October 1945.

The squadron flew the most sorties of any Australian bomber squadron and dropped more bomb tonnage than any squadron in the whole of Bomber Command—24,856 tons, which it dropped over 6,262 sorties. In doing that it lost 188 aircraft and suffered 1,018 combat deaths (589 of whom were Australian). This was the most of any Australian squadron during the war, with No. 460 Squadron effectively wiped out five times over its existence. RAF Bomber Command represented only two percent of total Australian enlistments during World War II, but accounted for almost 20 percent of personnel killed in action. Total Bomber Command losses were 55,573 for all nationalities.

ASSINGTON ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION

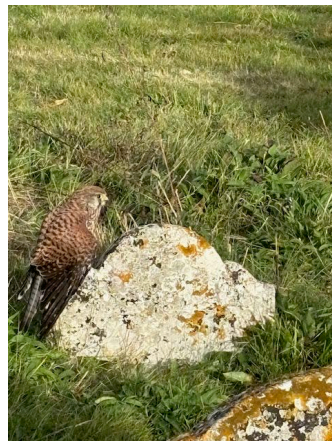
We are keen to build a waiting list of interested residents who may in the future be looking to take on an allotment

NATIONAL GRID WORK

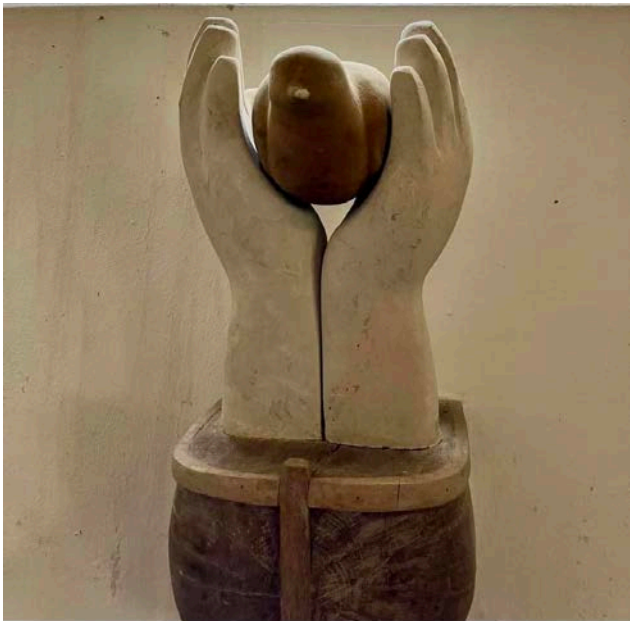
County Councillor Finch has received this notification relating to the Bramford to Twinsted Line Reinforcement project:

Following on from the Secretary of State's decision to approve our development consent order application for the Bramford to Twinsted Reinforcement last month, our appointed contractor (Balfour Beatty) will begin site familiarisation activity next week. As a result of this, residents may notice members of the contractor team out on-site across the project area.

These initial visits will take the form of walkover surveys, with the contractors due to visit key locations along the project route. Any appropriate permissions have been obtained in advance. This work is in addition to other pre-construction surveys already taking place, ahead of the planned start of major construction activity in the first half of 2025.

We will share more information on our approach to construction works in the coming months.

THE RETURN OF THE DOVE!



It was a lovely sunny afternoon on Saturday 5 October and I had not long started out on a walk with our dog Mabel in The Thicks when the call on my mobile phone arrived. The great thing about 'Caller ID' is that I could see it was from David Wiles and when I answered all he said was, "You will not believe what I've found!"... Of course, I had no idea but from the tone of his voice I could tell this was really good news. You will already know from the title of this article exactly what David had found but at that moment it was so unexpected and so wonderful. The stone dove that had gone missing from 'The Renewal of Life' sculpture in our church almost a year ago had been found!

David explained how he and Karen were cleaning up at the church and while round the back of the building, David had spotted what turned out to be the head of the stone dove poking out of the water in the rainwater tank. We talked at length about 'the what's, 'the how's and 'the why's and that there would need to be some work but that all-in-all the sculpture would soon be complete again.

After taking in the news, Mabel and I completed our once-round-The-Thicks and started our way home. I met a number of other Assington people on our walk and the next surprise was just how delighted they were to hear that the dove had been found! By coincidence it was a 'mobile library' Saturday so that helped spread the good news. It was lovely to be reminded how important Dick Heseltine's sculpture is to people and that it would once more be completed when the dove is placed back in the stone hands rising from the bow of Noah's ark.

How had the dove found its way into the tank? Who put it there? How long had the dove been there? Was this some sort of performance art with the dove reenacting the earlier part of the Noah's flood story before it launches out of Noah's hands?(.....Probably Not). By the amount of black slime coating the body of the dove, it was clear the dove had been there a long time and we guess that the water level in the tank had dropped just enough for the head to become visible but it's a lot of guess-work.

We will probably never know the story of what happened to it over the previous 11 months but the dove is back. There is a small amount of damage that will need to be attended to but it is drying out and returning to its original colour.

Dick titled his sculpture 'The Renewal of Life' and it's apt that its 'life' will be renewed in time for our Remembrance Sunday Service this year.

Thank you to those who attended the Service on Sunday, to "Raise the Song of Harvest Home" in our beautiful village church.



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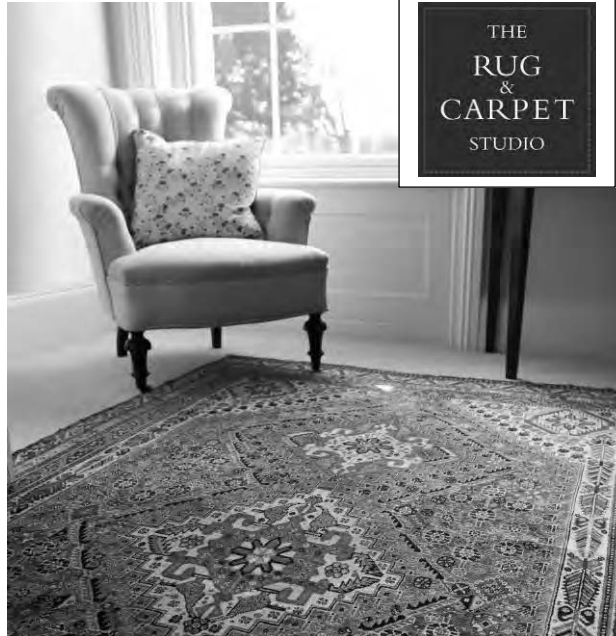
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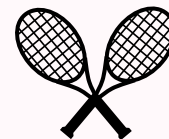

Then a day of national commemoration: Remembrance Sunday, when we come together to honour those who have died in conflict. It's in many ways a sad time, and I hope you will forgive my tactlessness (or poor taste!) in raising the whole subject of death, something we usually prefer not to think about.

I have attended a couple of very moving and beautiful family funerals recently, and have been so grateful to be able to just sit quietly in a pew and remember the life of a relation, and well... yes, cry.

As a church minister I feel very privileged to be able to conduct funerals and to offer pastoral care and a sense of hope to those who are mourning. Jesus Christ's teaching about Heaven is such an important aspect of the Christian faith. Apparently even secular, humanistic funeral celebrants are often asked to include the Lord's Prayer and a couple of hymns!

Nowadays you can opt for a "no-frills cremation" when the elderly are encouraged to sign up for a 'low-cost' non-funeral, not wanting 'to be a burden' and not 'wanting any fuss'. But 'a fuss' is exactly what we need when our loved one dies. Planning a service and gathering to pay tribute is a time-honoured way of helping us to grieve well. We should remember that funerals are really for those of us who are left behind, an opportunity for us to both reminisce and mourn.

In my ministry to people who are bereaved I find what's needed most is a proper funeral ceremony, a chance to feel both sad and hopeful, surrounded by family and friends. We are here to help with planning, and to be a listening ear to anyone trying to come to terms with their loss.

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
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ASSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Matters of Interest discussed during a meeting held at Assington Village Hall on Monday 30 September 2024 at 7.30pm

Present: Councillors Simon Thorogood Andrew Hill, Bronwen Stacey, Helen Wallace and David Wiles.

In attendance: DCllr Lee Parker, CCllr James Finch, Christine Hargan (Clerk) and 16 members of the public. The Chair welcomed two members of the Police Force and also BDC Communities officer

Apologies for absence: Councillors Jordan and Howcroft
■ County and District Councillor reports and **public forum Suffolk County Council Report Highlights:**

•The Bramford to Twinstead Reinforcement has been ongoing since 2009, The Secretary of State has approved the application in principle subject to approval by Suffolk County Council Highways. The County Council have objected to the plans from the inception through to the approval, no detailed plans appear to be in place.

•Some local residents have received legal papers regarding compulsory acquisition of their land, the letter is worded ambiguously and recipients have interpreted it in various ways. Whilst a purchase of land by National Grid cannot be stopped it can be mitigated. Residents have been advised to appoint a local land agent. Cllrs Thorogood and Finch can advise privately of specialist companies. Full costs can be claimed from National Grid.

•There is no firm date for commencement of construction due to the requirement of SCC to agree the plans which include construction of a haul road along the length of the line.

•Ofstead have inspected children's services, and noted an improvement to an already outstanding report, inspectors concluded that children's safeguarding is strong and their experience of the care system in Suffolk remains the CC's priority.

•A serious fire at the recycling centre in Great Blakenham was caused by batteries. Residents are asked to recycle batteries and NOT dispose of them in black bins.

•Relaunch of the purchasing group Solar Together which provides cheaper access to solar panels and may be available for listed buildings. Further details via [Suffolk.gov.uk/news](https://www.suffolk.gov.uk/news)

•Cllr Finch appealed for additional foster parents to help local youngsters. Further information can be acquired from Suffolk County Council.

• **Road signage** when utilities undertake essential maintenance and divert traffic they should also be accountable for removing signs. SCC fine companies for leaving signs once the work is completed and is considering an increase of fines to the companies.

•Residents in the Rose Green area are deeply concerned with speeding motorists to the point that some feel it is too dangerous to use the road to walk especially with children and prams. CCllr Finch will gain advice from highways to find a solution.

Babergh District Council report: Cllr Parker reported that:

•The current regime of refuse collection which has been in place for 20 years is changing in April, a simpler recycling scheme will be introduced with better recycling, a food caddy and an additional blue bin and will be able to recycle glass. Cllrs mooted that parish charities financially benefit from glass recycling.

•CIL continues the good work £800,000 distributed in the recent round of grants.

•Devolution in Suffolk has been rejected for the time being,

•Urgent government action has been requested to end the lack of council housing

•Locality budget is available

Public forum

Suffolk Police were welcomed. The Community Speed Watch group expressed their disappointment regarding lack of Police support and reported a number of problems including motorcycles racing through the village, various types of vehicles travelling at excessive speed and cars with loud exhausts. The Community Speed Watch having worked voluntarily to assist the Police for 4 years, had received a letter during the summer following a complaint from a member

of the public. The letter criticised their operation which had been approved by the Police force.

The officer explained that there are three teams in the local Police area, Cameras, Traffic and Community Policing. Within the teams only some officers are trained in speed monitoring. There are three cameras between 4 people, and the teams require more intelligence to establish where and when speeding happens so that they can direct resources to manage the problem.

Whilst it is appreciated that data is sent to the Control Centre, when it is forwarded to the individual teams it is done via a third party and contact details of the originator have been removed. The Community Policing Team need an email ideally to notify dates of offences, locations, incident times, make and model of the car to enable the team to review ANPR details, a marker can then be placed on vehicles. The process will take a month or more due to operational issues and prioritising workload.

Residents can report minor traffic offences which are a nuisance including all the things reported by Cllr Wiles, the identity of the reporter will not be disclosed therefore members of the public should be confident that there will be no recriminations when reporting offences, however the reports should be as detailed as possible and include make, model of vehicle and location of the issue Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) will be used to identify the vehicle and a marker will be placed on it to ensure that it gets stopped. A section 59 notice could be placed on a vehicle doing so provides officers with the power to seize a vehicle if a warning is ignored it:

- Deals with the anti-social use of motor vehicles on public roads or off-road.
- Is issued when vehicles are used to cause distress, alarm, annoyance, or in an anti-social manner.
- Allows police officers and PCSOs to seize vehicles being used in an anti-social manner.
- stays on the vehicle if they get 2 Section 59s their vehicle can be seized.

■If the issue is with drugs, suspicious activity, or known drunk drivers the same process should be followed. With antisocial behaviour if there are a number of ASBs the Police will escalate. Reports will be treated as anonymous to protect the source.

If the village wants an engagement day, the Community Policing Team (CPT) will be happy to oblige at weekends and can also provide posters and other resources both to community groups and schools.

In conclusion Assington is a quiet rural area therefore it is identified as low priority. The Community Police Team is willing and keen to help however, they acknowledge that timely communication within the force remains a problem and ask to be copied into any correspondence with the Police Force.

Cllr Wallace acknowledges speeding issues in The Street, but problems also exist in Marshall's Green and Barracks road where the speed limit reduces to 30MPH Cllr Hill responded that unfortunately it is not possible for Speed Watch to operate in those locations because there is nowhere along the lanes with a clear 100 metres in either direction, however, it may be possible to request the presence of a Police vehicle.

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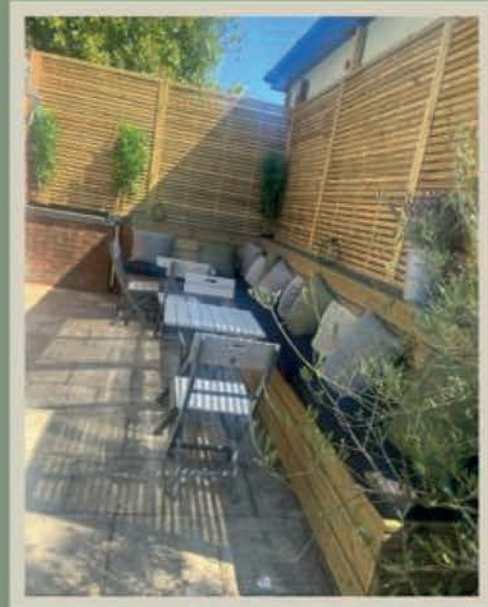


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
