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

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HARVEST IN ASSINGTON, AND OUR FOODBANK COLLECTION

Our Harvest Service will take place in St Edmund's Church at 10.30am on Sunday, 20th October. As always, the church is beautifully decorated with the fruits of harvest, seasonal flowers and foliage. Please do join us for this annual celebration; contributions from children (and adults too!) are accepted at the front of the church at an appointed stage in the Service.



We are so very lucky to live in Assington: we have a lovely, caring community, and beautiful countryside around us, and nature on our doorstep. Our local farmers work very hard throughout the year, battling the many foibles of the weather and everything else life throws at them.

However, some people living close to us are not so fortunate. Over the last

couple of years the cost of living has increased, and consequently the demand for food from families struggling to make ends meet has increased greatly.

As we now have a local 'Foodbank' outside the Village Hall, where food etc items may be placed, to be shared by people who are not so financially secure, it is appreciated that some of us are already donating foodstuffs at a very local level, both in Assington and at local superstores in Sudbury, on a regular basis.

In addition, every year, here in Assington, as part of the celebration of another Harvest, we collect food donations, for delivery to the Storehouse Foodbank, which is run by the Vineyard Church in Sudbury. Currently the list of items which they need are as follows:

spam/corned beef	soup (basic flavours)
minced beef and onion	ravioli
tuna	pasta sauce
mac n cheese	custard
hot dogs	toilet rolls
meatballs	rice
chicken curry	snack bars
chilli con carne tins	washing up liquid

If you are able to donate such items, **we should be most grateful if you would bring them along to the Harvest Service in Church. We very much hope and look forward to seeing you then.**

Not only do the donations make a lovely 'modern day' equivalent to the more traditional fruit and veg box of our childhood, but they also demonstrate our celebration and giving thanks for the harvest which gives us our supply of food throughout the year; they also make such a difference to the lives of others, which of course is the true spirit of the reason we do this.

If you are not able to join us at the church service, but wish to donate items to our Assington Collection for the foodbank, **there will also be a collection box in the village Farm Shop at The Barns, until Saturday, 19th October, and a collection table at the back of the hall at the Harvest Supper on Friday 18th October**

NATURE WATCH

The last week of July brought sightings of scarce butterflies and dragonflies, in Assington Thicks. These included a Purple Emperor, 4 Silver-washed Fritillaries, 3 White Admirals and 2 Purple Hairstreaks, plus a Southern Migrant Hawker.

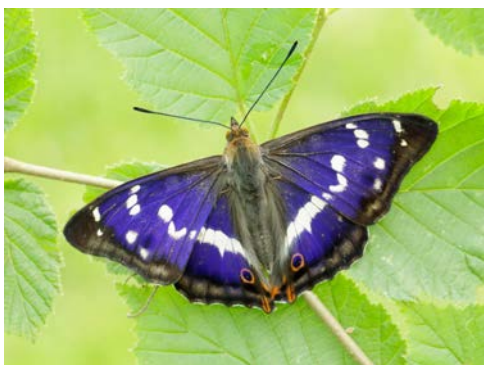
In The Street, another Stag beetle has been added to the tally notified to the County recorder, and he's keen to hear of more sightings. This was a dead male Stag, with the classic huge antlers a full inch long, spotted by Susan Cohen outside no 18.

The creature was barely alive, having apparently been attacked by a magpie, and then seen dead the next day. It was previously considered Stag Beetles didn't usually occur north of Nayland, but in fact is seen regularly in parts of Leavenheath, Sudbury and yes, Assington. The females are hard to distinguish from the more common Lesser Stag, so please remember a female stag is over 3cm long, with wing-cases brown glossy not black.

Glow worms have again been visible in places, with some people photographing "Spouses Grove by Night"!

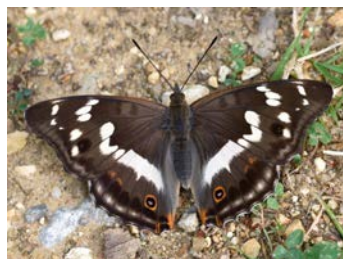
Purple Emperor

The Purple Emperor is a magnificent and elusive insect. This butterfly spends most of its time in the woodland canopy where it feeds on aphid honeydew, with the occasional close encounter when it comes down to feed on sap runs or, in the case of the male, moist ground that provide much-needed salts and minerals.



The male butterfly is one of the most beautiful of all of the butterflies found

in the British Isles. From certain angles it appears to have black wings intersected with white bands. However, when the wings are at a certain angle to the sun, the most beautiful purple sheen is displayed, a result of light being refracted from the structures of the wing scales.



The female, on the other hand, is a deep brown and does not possess the purple sheen found in the male.

The Goat Willow is the most widely used foodplant although it breeds on Grey Willow and more rarely Crack- Willow. Eggs are laid on a wide range of tree sizes, ranging from medium sized shrubs to tall canopy trees.

Silver-washed Fritillary

This butterfly is our largest fritillary and gets its name from the beautiful streaks of silver found on the underside of the wings. The bright orange male is quite distinctive as it flies powerfully along woodland rides, pausing only briefly to feed



or investigate anything with an orange hue that could be a potential mate. The male has four distinctive black veins on its forewings that contain special "androconial" scales that are used in courtship. These veins are known as "sex brands". The female is paler than the male, has rounder wings and more-prominent spots. In England and Wales, the Silver-washed Fritillary is found in woodlands south of a line between Montgomeryshire in the west and East Kent in the east, with a few scattered colonies elsewhere.

White Admiral

The White Admiral

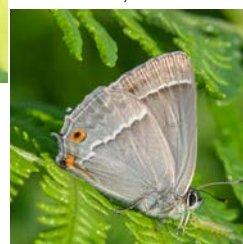


is a woodland species and a delight to behold as it literally glides along forest rides, flying from tree to forest floor and back up with only a few effortless wing beats. For this reason, some of its closest relatives on the continent are known as "gliders". When settled, the adults are unmistakable, with their black uppersides intersected by prominent white bars. The undersides of this butterfly are, however, in complete contrast to the black-and-white upper sides, and are surely one of the most beautiful of all species found in the British Isles.

The distribution of this species in the early 1900s had declined to the point that it was restricted to southern England. However, there seems to have been a reversal of fortunes, with the butterfly reaching its former distribution that extends as far north as Lincolnshire. One explanation is that global warming has allowed the species to thrive at sites that had become too cool. Another is that the cessation of coppicing, that has been detrimental to so many woodland butterflies, has benefited this species which requires Honeysuckle growing in shady woodland for the successful development of its larvae.

Purple Hairstreak

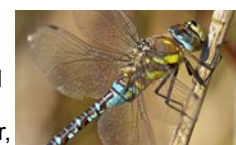
This handsome butterfly is widely distributed throughout southern areas wherever there are oak trees; even a solitary tree may support a colony. It is frequently



overlooked as adults remain largely in the canopy where the main adult food source is honeydew; they fly more commonly in the evening of a warm summer's day. However, the adults are occasionally seen basking at lower levels, on various small trees, shrubs and bracken.

Southern Migrant Hawker dragonfly

The Migrant hawker is a medium-sized hawker dragonfly that is on the wing from the end of July through to October, or even November in warm years. It is a very common species and can be found hunting in gardens, grassland and woodland some distance from its breeding ponds. Hawkers are the largest and fastest flying dragonflies; they catch their insect-prey mid-air and can hover or fly backwards.

In mid-August a Kingfisher was seen at the Arger Fen water-splash. They only occur very intermittently along the Brook these days.

Swallows have been seen in good numbers in some places locally this year, also House Martins in a few places, and a small number of Swifts. How great that at Market Hill in Sudbury, 26 House Martin nests have been counted in good repair, most of them occupied.

Spotted Flycatchers have again been few locally, though a family has been seen in Arger Fen, and later possibly the same family, visiting round the area for the odd day or two. Such entrancing birds, perching on a high bare twig from where they dart out repeatedly to catch their tiny snacks. The diminutive Ruby-tailed Wasp has put in a few late appearances, it's most often seen in May. The metallic brilliance of its blue and red colours is memorable indeed.

If you are feeding birds this winter, please be sure to wash your feeders thoroughly with some bleach in water, and try to protect the feed from rain. Disease is spreading so badly, especially among finches, via feeders; also please don't put feeders in woods or other wild places.

Fungi often make a very good showing in The Thicks and elsewhere, and this year **the Tiger Hill Fungus Foray will be at 2pm on Sunday 3rd November; please car-share.**

Elsewhere in Assington a **Sexton Beetle**, (looking somewhat like a large bee when first espied, owing to its size and colouring) was carried inside with some empty boxes which had been stored in the barn.



The Common Sexton Beetle is a chunky, flattened and squarish beetle, with bright black-and-orange patterning on its wing cases. There are several species of burying beetle in the UK which can be difficult to tell apart. The **Sexton Beetles** are so-called because they are 'burying beetle': these beetles are the undertakers of the animal world, burying dead and decaying animals, such as mice and small birds. Common sexton beetles can be found wherever there are corpses for them to feed on, and often fly into lights at night. Males and females pair-up at the corpse and will fight off rivals to take charge of it and bury it. The female lays her eggs on, or beside, the buried body and the resulting larvae eat the rotting corpse. Burying beetles are unusual in the beetle-world because both males and females continue to care for the larvae after they hatch - feeding them from the corpse. Their antennae

are equipped with receptors that are able to detect rotting bodies from metres, even kilometres, away.

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RIDE AND STRIDE REPORT

The starting point for this year's ride was Cockfield. I parked near the station, long redundant and surprisingly not repurposed. The church is nearby and was much larger than I expected for the size of the village.

The next stop was Felsham where I

was drawn to the font. The top section was old and well carved,



but of more interest was the base which had a much greater age and likely pagan origins. It included several characters around it including the one pictured.

I then cycled to Rattlesden, which is a very picturesque village,

complemented by a magnificent church set on high ground in the middle. It retains its rood screen and the roof beams are covered in a host of carved angels. Given



the ongoing project to provide kitchen and toilet facilities at Assington Church I also took interest in their modern additions. I found that Rattlesden Church had been fortunate in owning land in the village, the sale of which had funded both repairs and improvements.

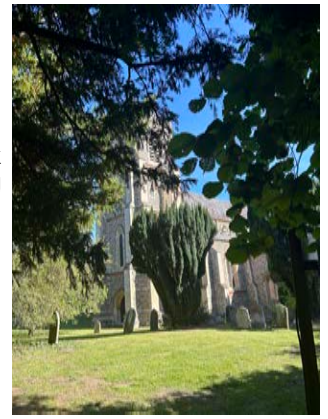
Woolpit was my

next stop. Another very attractive village with a large church that also retained its rood screen and carved angels on the roof. My exploration of the interior was limited by a well-supported craft fair that was in full swing.

I then moved into previously unexplored territory, crossing to the north of the A14 to go to Tostock Church. This was notable for its old pews with wonderfully carved figures at the ends. Many had been literally defaced by the Puritans, but others remained intact. In particular there were a variety of mythical beasts, one of my favourites being the pictured unicorn.



Also north of the A12 was Thurston Church. Approached through the shade of large trees, with the church sunlit beyond, it was a reminder of how spectacular Suffolk churches can be. Although retaining a flint and stone construction it is largely Victorian, built following a tower collapse in 1860 which also destroyed most of the rest of the church.



The plan was to cycle through the centre of Bury St Edmunds to get to my next stop, but a wrong turn took me into our local Bermuda Triangle - Morton Hall industrial estate. So many ways in, but none out. Either some of our local businesses are very large, or I passed them several times. When I eventually got back to my route I had missed the town completely.

I had a break at Nowton Park, which I expect to be busy when their display of daffodils is in bloom, but now know is packed any Saturday when the sun shines. Nowton Church is in an elevated position close to Nowton Hall and looked to be closely associated with the estate that would have served the Hall in the past. It was a very peacefully location with long views across the countryside.

Next I went through Hawstead, past the alms houses provided for the "benefit of the aged and deserving poor" by Philip Metcalf esquire in 1811. I expected to find mention of him in Hawstead Church, but it appears he spent his money on good deeds, whilst



others spent their money on their impressive monuments. There were some spectacular examples on display.

Little Welnetham was another quiet rural church, where I was fascinated by a carving of a large bird. My initial assumption was that it was a lectern similar to those seen at Assington and other churches, in the form of an eagle. Closer

inspection revealed this not to be the case. There was nowhere to rest a book and, at around two meters high you would need a step ladder to be able to provide a reading. The face of the bird was strange, similar to the pottery by the Martin Brothers (regular watchers of the Antiques Roadshow will know what I mean).



My journey was completed by visits to the two Bradfields, St George and St Claire. A rather vacant looking statue of St George made their connection clear, but not much about St Claire. I assume the link is to the follower of Francis of Assisi.

As in previous years I was struck by the wonderful churches we have in the county and the variety of historic buildings they represent. I could also see the challenges in preserving these buildings for the future, highlighting the role of the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust. Thank you to all my sponsors, your contributions will be put to good use.

17 My route was a modest 35 miles, but still left me immobile for ten minutes that evening with cramp in both legs.

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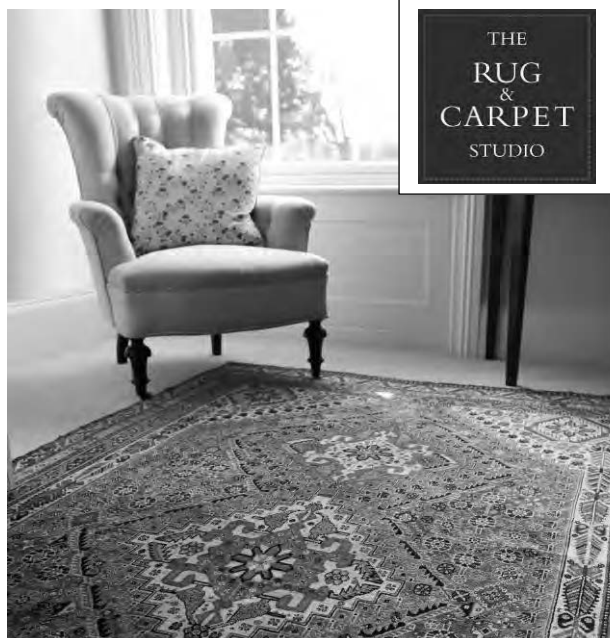
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ASSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Matters of Interest discussed during a meeting held at Assington Village Hall on Monday 29 July 2024 at 7.30pm

Present: Councillors Andrew Hill, Ian Jordan, Bronwen Stacey, Tony Howcroft and David Wiles

In attendance: DCllr Lee Parker, CCllr James Finch, Christine Hargan (Clerk) and two members of the public

■ Apologies for absence

Councillors Simon Thorogood and Helen Wallace. In the absence of the chairman it was agreed that Cllr Hill would chair the meeting

■ County and District Councillor reports and public forum

Suffolk County Council Report Highlights:

- Permission for a huge solar park in West Suffolk has been granted by the government
- Autism: plans to diagnose and assist both adults and children with the condition have been outlined
- Climate change remains on the council agenda
- Cold calling: residents are warned not to accept offers to undertake work by doorstep callers
- Fostering and adoption: the county is in need of additional fosterers particularly for emergency child care. Gaining fosterers employed by the council will reduce the huge bill for agency fosterers. 70% of fosterers are recruited via drop-in surgeries. Residents are encouraged to volunteer
- Speed Indicator Devices and ANPR cameras have been vandalised locally,
- Acknowledged ANPRs are run by the Police in conjunction with SCC. CCllr Finch to speak to Tim Passmore to invite police to a future meeting

Babergh District Council report: Cllr Parker reported that:

- Very little business was conducted before week commencing 23 July given the two elections (government and crime commissioner).
- Full council met last week. Main discussion points were CIFCO (the BDC and MSDC property investment company) and Listed Building Consent Orders which would offer a smoother route to add energy efficiency for owners of historic buildings. By the end of the year BDC should be the first local authority to adopt a lenient approach to energy efficiency in listed buildings, this would include insulation, solar panels, heating etc. Cllr Stacey has participated in the consultation.

•Heaven to Betsy coach "in the Layby at the A134 Junction with the A1071: the Burger Van that was previously vending has been removed. As the land belongs to the County Council, CCllr Finch will enquire whether permission has been sought to vend on a permanent basis. DCllr Parker will ask Environmental Health to investigate if/when it begins trading

•Parking charges will be voted on on Friday 2 August. DCllr Parker advised lobbying cabinet members direct if the Parish Council wishes to oppose the scheme, which is expected to raise £1.8 million a year. There are costs attributed to maintaining car parks within the towns including machines, potholes, signage etc. 1 hour free parking would reduce the profit from parking by approximately £600,000, but still deliver a £1.2m profit. The scrutiny committee made a compromise proposal regarding the scheme but this is expected to be rejected by the Cabinet on Friday. Support of the compromise proposal to allow 1 hour free parking was reiterated by APC.

Assington Autos:

BDC Planning Committee met on 24 July to discuss the planning application by Assington Autos to extend the

operational area of their site. Cllr Jordan and a representative of the residents who had objected attended to speak in support of the objections to the proposal. Councillors took the view that consent subject to the conditions proposed (plus a strengthening of the condition relating to the use of heavy machinery on a Saturday morning and a new condition on the installation of solar panels) could provide the Council with a valuable set of levers to ensure more effective regulation for the future. They stressed the need for effective enforcement, however, given the local concerns on noise in particular. The Planning Committee approved the application.

❖ Assington Speed watch

The Speed Watch (CSW) team has suspended its activities, disappointed that little support has been forthcoming from the Police. Cllr Wiles received a letter from a Suffolk Police community officer who had visited the village following a complaint regarding the Speed watch team, who were not notified of his forthcoming visit. After three years' work by members of the group, who have reported over 4000 vehicles, the Police have provided little support. DCllr Parker added that Assington is not the only village in the area to have had similar concerns and to have stopped as a result.

Cllr Finch informed that the Police Commissioner had offered for Community Police Officers to attend Parish Council meetings on request. Clerk to formally request a visit by the CPO at one of the two remaining meetings this year via Cllr Finch, with cc to DCllr Parker.

Cllr Stacey suggested there is a need to continue to do something to support the speed limit through the village, such as signs on entry to Assington warning that the village is a speed watch area or alternatively investment in a speed reminder system. Cllr Howcroft highlighted the demonstrable success in resolving the problem of excessive speed following the reduction of the speed limit, and questioned the need for further investment or enforcement. The low level of interest from parishioners regarding joining the CSW team could reflect that the level of concern in the village regarding speeding has now reduced.

Cllr Hill therefore suggested a speed survey to determine the current extent of the problem (a wire counter collecting vehicle speeds), and to consider any police response at the September meeting. Clerk to enquire about survey via CCllr Finch and to raise concerns regarding the lack of support for CSW to CCllr Finch.

Thanks were extended to the Speed Watch volunteers for all their work and the many volunteer hours contributed to date. The topic will be revisited at a later meeting.

- To consider a donation toward the Sudbury CAB. It was confirmed that CAB benefit Assington residents directly and that any donation would be in line with APC policy on donations.

Resolved to donate £100

■ Questions to the Chair

- ❖ 20mph speed limit stickers have been delivered to parishioners by Cllrs Stacey and Jordan. Thanks were recorded
- ❖ Cllr Howcroft: noted that the project to extent the Stour Valley National Landscape to Sudbury was rejected as insufficiently large, and that a seat has always been available for Suffolk's Parish Councils on the AONB board. This has now been taken up by a neighbouring Parish Council, and consideration will be given to a larger expansion covering the upper Stour, Brett & Box valleys.
- ❖ Cllr Wiles reported that new doors will be delivered and fitted to the Village Hall in the week of 19 August.
- ❖ The Sudbury AFC Under-15 football team will use the playing field and changing facilities for the coming season, and a memorial to Ted Nichols would be played on the field. APC's condolences to be sent to the Nichols family, recognising the substantial contribution made by Ted to the village.

■ **Date of the next meeting:** Monday 30th September to be held in the Village Hall at 7.30pm. Apologies from Cllr Jordan were noted for the next meeting.

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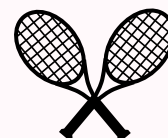
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Letter from the Rev Daniel Whiffin, Vicar of Bures with Assington and Little Cornard

Dear friends

You might say that harvest is the time when the quality of soil is revealed. Of course, weather conditions have a lot to do with it. But all things being equal, you would expect a field with good soil to show itself with a high yield of good crop. Whereas bad soil would be revealed by a small yield.

Jesus plays on this idea in his famous 'Parable of the Sower/ Soils' which you can find in three of the Gospels: Matthew 13, Mark 4 and Luke 8. Here though, he is asking the question of how good we are at listening. Are we good soil when receiving the seed of his teaching? Just as the quality of a field is shown at harvest time, the quality of our listening will be shown up, one day.

According to Jesus, some people are more like concrete than soil. His teaching just bounces off like a seed bounces along a path with nowhere to settle and take root. Other people are like a thin layer of topsoil over rock. They only listen to Jesus long enough to get a feeling that he's a good guy. But when they start to sense what being his disciple really means, they quickly forget even that small amount of what he said. I think the third 'soil type' is rather pertinent to our age. These people listen to all sorts of competing voices—the gods of our world with deceitful promises—wealth, success, homeownership, healthcare as the great saviour, and the like. These voices are like weeds in your vegetable bed, stealing away the goodness of the soil. Only the fourth type of person really listens to Jesus and knows the joy of having a life he has transformed and made productive.

In Jesus' parable the seed is sown on all sorts of soil, indiscriminately. Likewise, all of us have the opportunity to hear Jesus' "words of eternal life". When the harvest time comes, will we be revealed as people who have really listened to him?

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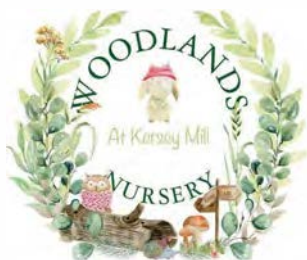
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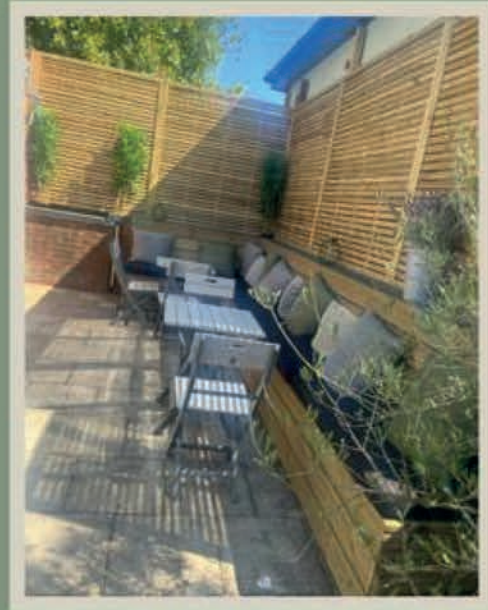
